Philadelphia Heads to the Polls on Primary Election Day

Philadelphians will head to the polls on **May 16, 2023,** to select party nominees to serve as the city's 100th Mayor, City Council, Controller's Office, City Commissioners, Sheriff, and Register of Wills. Voters will also choose nominees for a slate of municipal and statewide judges.

Voters in Pennsylvania can vote in person, by mail, or by absentee ballot. All three methods are safe and secure! Voters who want to vote by mail or by absentee ballot should be sure to request their ballot by the May 9th deadline. (*Committee of Seventy*, 4/17/23)

Register to Vote or Check Your Voter Registration Status

Citizens registered as Democrat or Republican are eligible to vote in the primaries. "If you're one of **PA's 1.1 million independent voters**, you'd be forgiven for not having it circled on your calendar. That's because Pennsylvania's closed primary system bars independent and unaffiliated voters from participating – even though the primaries are the decisive contest in districts across the Commonwealth.
