Stay Informed: Knowledge is power. Keep yourself updated on the latest clean energy developments, climate policies, and environmental news. Follow trusted sources and stay curious. You can also check out the <u>United Nations Sustainable Development Goals</u> which provide a shared blueprint for peace and prosperity for people and the planet, now and into the future.]

Support Renewable Initiatives: Embrace renewable energy solutions. Consider adopting solar panels, supporting wind energy projects, or simply reducing your carbon footprint at home.

Advocate for Policy Change: Your voice matters. Engage with your local representatives and advocate for stronger clean energy policies.
